tonya thames-taylor is an Associate Professor of History (American), founding director of the African American Studies Program, member of the Executive Committee of the Frederick Douglass Institute, and currently the interim director of Rustin Urban Community Change AxiS (RUCCAS) at West Chester University. In April 2022, she was recognized as one of the 150 Most Influential Women at West Chester University. Her most recent body of work includes lectures on the importance of the Declaration of Independence, Constitution, and the impact of the work of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. She is a graduate of Tougaloo College, a Historically Black College and University (HBCU), in Tougaloo, Miss. She earned her Master of Arts in history and a Ph.D. in American History from The University of Mississippi (Ole Miss) in Oxford, Miss.
